



Age-Friendly University

By 2030, 1 in 6 people around the world will be 60 years or older due to the rising global population and individuals living longer. In response to this demographic shift, an international Age-Friendly City (AFC) movement was launched to optimize environments and services that promote the participation, health, and well-being of older adults. The Age-Friendly University (AFU) initiative was born out of this broader movement due to post-secondary institutions having the potential to offer educational, health and wellness, arts and cultural, and civic engagement opportunities that can benefit older adults and facilitate connections across generations. However, most post-secondary institutions have not yet adapted for a rapidly growing aging population.

Since 2015, Calgary has been recognized by the World Health Organization as an AFC. In a bid to leverage this global recognition and better support older adults, UCalgary joined the AFU Global Network. The AFU initiative at UCalgary is being led by the Brenda Strafford Centre on Aging, an aging hub whose mission is to create an ecosystem for innovation in age-inclusive environments, practices, and policies. We are focused on catalyzing networks and leading collaborative innovations centered on older adults through education, research, and community engagement. With your support, UCalgary's commitment to being age-friendly will benefit the campus community and beyond by engaging older adults in education and research activities, promoting intergenerational and lifelong learning, and establishing age-friendly policies and practices.

Our Vision

Post-secondary settings have historically been structured to meet the needs and interests of young adult students and young- to middle-aged employees. However, the number of non-traditional aged students (21 years of age or older) enrolling in a university degree program for the first time and the number of older students (50 years of age or older) pursuing university education to change careers, advance their careers, or extend their career trajectories is expected to rise. Retaining older employees who have invaluable knowledge and skills, particularly in specialized occupations such as teaching and research, will also become increasingly important with growing labour shortages.

Greater age diversity among UCalgary students, faculty, and staff creates opportunities for intergenerational interactions to occur and can help combat ageism, reducing discrimination against older adults. As a community-integrated institution, enhancing UCalgary's age-friendliness will ensure that older Calgarians feel valued and encourage them to take advantage of the enriching experiences catalyzed by our campus community. Further, an age diverse campus community is likely to better understand the needs of an aging society and generate more creative solutions to aging problems.
